Ephesians 4:1-16

So today is a step of growth, looking forward in eager anticipation of discovering wonderful new adventures together with Jesus. It certainly would be sad if today was the end of our growth as a person. God has got so much more in store for us to discover. The adventure is nowhere near over.

The second thing that Paul reminds me of is that I'm to be growing in Christ. Over the last few years I've been signing off all my correspondence with; 'In Christ'. That's a reminder to me of where I need

to be growing. Well that's not quite right is it? It's a reminder not of where but of whom I need to be growing to know, growing in the wonderful gift of sharing his adventure of life.

My growth isn't aimless or pointless. grow me to greater maturity, or dig me deeper, loosing out on life. To grow healthy and strong the choice is simple; **JESUS**. Does it grow me closer in my relationship to Jesus? If not then I need to change because I don't want to be growing in the wrong direction.

In life there are lots of ways to grow. When I was young I grew up, and that was good. As I've got older I've grown out, and that's not so good!

In life we can make healthy choices or unhealthy ones. I'm sure everyone wants to make healthy choices, reaping the most out of life. Enjoying life to the full. Anyone here today want to live life to the full?

Then the choices we make are crucial. I can want to live life to the full, but if I chose to eat fat, fat and more fat, and then a

few chips for a balanced diet, what will the outcome be for my health? Bad, wouldn't you say. That's not because fat is mean, but because I made, and kept making some unhealthy choices, which, no surprise, would leave me with ill health.

How do you keep growing?

To grow healthy and strong I'm reminded today to keep growing in Christ. To keep him as my focus, and to grow close to him, sharing life with him.

The third thing I noticed in the text, a little word that caught my attention – All. Paul wrote; 'In ALL things grow up into Christ'. In how many things was that? 'ALL' All is all encompassing. What does it leave out? The way I play

football. The choices I make when buying a car. How fast I drive. What beer I drink, or more importantly how much I drink. After all; 'it's my body and I'll do what I like'.

Have you ever heard that phrase or similar? Not the way to grow up. Definitely not the way to make good healthy choices, but really unhealthy selfish ones.

Life is about; in ALL things growing in Christ. Growing in doing things Jesus' way. Would Jesus play Aussie Rules? I'm sure he would, because Jesus knows his Father created people physical, needing exercise to stay healthy, needing community to enjoy life, but I'm sure Jesus wouldn't play dirty. He'd have turned the other cheek and not retaliated, but he wouldn't have been a wimp. He'd go in

hard, but not out of a need to show how tough he was. That only proves you've got real social problems and need to be loved out of your aggression. Jesus would have played hard and fair and would have left the ground with no regrets; enjoying having played and shared life with others. And that enjoyment would have come whether he won or lost because the people around him are more important than the game.

In business, and economics are the people more important than the profit? As a pastor, are the people I meet more important than my role and the things I have set down on my agenda to achieve in the day?

Today Paul reminds us to keep growing in Christ, in ALL things.

The story of David and Bathsheba, which was continued from last week in the Old Testament reading for today, reminds me of what happens when I stop letting Jesus direct my growth and the decisions I make. David let his hormones get the better of him and

acted in a totally selfish, loveless, un-Christ-like way. Just because you think someone is hot isn't the healthiest way to decide whether to have sex with them or not. Yes, Jesus is interested in you having a healthy sex life. And being the creator he might just know something about it.

What does Jesus say in the 'Sermon on the Mount'? "You know the next commandment pretty

well, too: Don't go to bed with another's spouse.' But don't think you've preserved your virtue simply by staying out of bed. Your *heart* can be corrupted by lust even quicker than your *body*. Those leering looks you think nobody notices – they also corrupt." (Matthew 5:27,28 Message Paraphrase)

Jesus also shares with us how to build healthy, strong, intimate relationships.

Ones that led to enjoying life, blessing not only us but the people around us, as well as the whole community. David's lust only left him in pain and death. Jesus' love grows us to be healthy people. People who can be open and honest because we are forgiven, we are loved by God. He has withheld nothing from us. Now instead of grasping to fill a hole in our lives, we are loved by God, in
